## FROM THE DESK OF MAYOR WILLIAMS

There is currently a large scale neighborhood utility easement tree pruning project underway that started on September 3<sup>rd</sup> by LG&E and sub-contractors of LG&E. It will take several weeks beginning with the lines along Hess Lane working south covering the lines from Robin to Cross Bill. After that they will work from the Cross Bill/Chickadee intersection out to Poplar Level Rd. Each of the sections should take approximately 2 weeks to complete and the overall impact on Audubon Park will be limited to approximately a month. LG&E will be contacting affected properties via mailer, door hanger notice, e-mail or phone.

New, taller utility poles may also be added in certain problematic areas. If you receive damage from any part of this process, call the LG&E customer service line at 502-589-1444 to register a concern. You may also contact Matthew Wieczorek, who is the head utility arborist for this project with questions. Matthew can be reached at 502-544-3455 or Matthew.Wieczorek@lge-ku.com.

Some recent tree pruning along the railway was performed during the month of August, affecting the rear yards of a few residents on Robin Road. That particular job was by Norfolk Southern, and not LG&E. If you live on Robin Road and have a damage claim to submit regarding your rear yard property damage, the agent for Norfolk Southern is Brian Carr and he can be reached at 502-775-4972.

I'm excited to share that the City's Forestry Code is nearly complete after years of work and the remaining code of ordinances is currently being updated to conform to the last 23 years of both new state law and ordinances passed by the City of Audubon Park. Similar projects are also under way targeting the City's employee handbook, new resident welcoming packet, and City Hall building maintenance. Small beautification efforts will also continue.

The fiscal year 2020 budget, which began July 1<sup>st</sup>, is basically a stay-the-course plan, with some resources added for reforestation, community activities, and supplemental road repair funds. Another phase of road paving should start in the Summer of 2020 after all bids have been received. Oriole Drive will be the first repaving project in this next phase along with another road or two, based on both the severity of repairs and the allocation of funds. More details regarding road paving will be shared at a later date.

Our 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Auktoberfest will be on September 28<sup>th</sup> from 4PM to 9PM in Oriole Park. Please see the enclosed flyer for more details. When City events like

We would also like feedback after this event to determine if the City will continue to have a City-wide yard sale in the future.

Once again, I thank you for your continued confidence and support as we work together to continue to move our great City forward. Have a safe and fantastic fall!!!


# **FOREST BOARD NEWS**

With fall quickly approaching, I hope that we all will be enjoying the beauty of the changing leaves in the coming months. As those leaves fall to the ground, homeowners often pile the leaves around the trunk of trees, thinking this natural mulch will serve as a benefit to their trees. While leaves do serve as a great natural mulch as our forest floors show, the piling of leaves around the base of trees can actually be detrimental to the long term health of our urban tree canopy. With

any mulching material, whether that be leaves, pine bark, or hardwood mulch, piling mulch around the trunk of the tree should be avoided. Such techniques, which include volcano mulching, can lead to fungal growth and rot of the tree's trunk, which will lead to a weakened tree and premature death. Instead, mulch should be applied in a thin layer of about two to three inches extending to the tree's dripline, which is defined as the outermost circumference of the tree's canopy, from which water drips onto the ground.

Proper tree mulch is shown in the graphic below provided by Morton Arboretum.

## **AUDUBON PARK POLICE**

What a fantastic time of year! School is in session and the kids are excited to see old friends and make new ones. I'd like for all of us to help the kids have a great year by remembering a few safety tips and following a few rules. Many children in the area walk to school. If you are traveling in the City, pay attention to

the 25 mph speed limit and watch for children in the roadway. Parents, consider placing something reflective on your child's clothing or backpack to help make them more visible to motorists. Every school year, we receive complaints from residents on Oriole Drive and Chickadee Road near Hess Lane. These are not authorized as drop off or pick up points for the nearby schools. Please, do the courteous thing and use the areas designated by the schools for drop off and pick up of your student. We also receive complaints about school buses speeding and motorists passing school buses while they are loading or unloading. You will see your Audubon Park Police Officers monitoring these situations and issuing citations as appropriate. Nothing is more important than the safety of our kids.

If your child will be home alone after school, make sure they know safety rules such as:

- Do not open the door to strangers.
- Know what to do in the case of emergency.
- How and when to call 911 for help.
- Know the rules on using social and digital media for kids and install parental controls.
- Consider installing motion activated video doorbells and other devices that notify you

when your child is home safely from school and other activities.

During the summer months, your child may have received a "citation" from one of your Audubon Park Police Officers for wearing a helmet while riding their bicycle. The Audubon Park Police Department has partnered with AAA East Central in the Helmet Smart program for the first time this year. It is a great way for officers to have a positive interaction with kids and foster long lasting relationships with the residents. Each "citation" includes a coupon for a McDonald's Happy Meal and an entry for a Helmet Smart Prize Drawing that can be mailed in to AAA East Central. Unfortunately this program ended in August but the officers had a lot of fun with the program and we are pleased to see so many children wearing their helmets in Audubon Park.

# <u>Celebrating Audubon Park's 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday with</u> <u>a Retrospective Look at Our Community with</u> Dr. Tom Owen

The Audubon Park Garden Club was first organized in 1929. Its mission is "to encourage all residents of Audubon Park to promote, through cooperation, the improvement of Audubon Park as a garden and bird center and to participate in local, state, and national garden and horticultural programs." Over the years, members of the Garden Club have been instrumental in beautifying Audubon Park's many decorative flower beds and in promoting tree planting and tree diversity in the five communal parks. As mentioned in the last newsletter, while we know the Garden Club turns 90 this year, no one has been able to determine its actual birthday. So the Garden Club decided to celebrate this milestone twice – first in May at our annual Spring Luncheon and again at our annual Fall Dinner in October with the program "Remembering Audubon Park 1929-2019".

**Dr. Tom Owen is a well-known historian in Louisville and also serves as the Archivist at the University of Louisville.** What many may <u>not</u>know is that Dr. Owen spent his early years living on Robin Road in Audubon Park and had other family members who lived in our city. So he is uniquely qualified to

speak to the history of Audubon Park in its early days through to the present.

# Fall Brightside Clean-up to be Held October 19th

The Garden Club sponsors two annual clean-ups under the auspices of Brightside; Garden Club member, Marie Eff, coordinates these events held in April and October. The fall clean-up is scheduled on **Saturday, October 19**<sup>th</sup> **at 9 a.m**. with volunteers gathering at the Preston Street entrance to Audubon Park. We hope that many residents will show up to clean up and beautify the City's western entrance on Preston

Highway at Audubon Parkway. In the spring, those volunteers collected eight bags of trash including debris from under the railroad overpass and we hope even more will turn out to participate in keeping our signature entrance to Audubon Park looking its best – especially now the entrance columns are lighted and new landscaping is in place. Gloves and t-shirts will be handed out to volunteers and students needing service hours are welcome! Also volunteers are encouraged to bring rakes, brooms and other trimming garden tools to help in the clean-up.

#### FRIENDLY REMINDERS

In addition to community calendars, event notices, meeting schedules, and official information, the entire City Code of Ordinances is available on the Web site, *AudubonParkKY.org*, with provisions on parking, permit requirements, nuisance abatement, and all the rest. Please visit often!

- Speed limits and other traffic control measures are strictly enforced, for your safety and security. The City speed limit is 25 mph.
- There is no parking permitted on the street between 2 AM and 6 AM. There is also no parking permitted on the grass. Please inform visitors of this important information.
- Pets must be leashed or otherwise under their owner's absolute physical control when outside. The return of spring birds is a special reminder to keep cats and others from straying. We now have Dog Waste Stations at each of our parks so please use them when dog walking, and picking up after your pets.
- Building permits are issued through City Hall and the form can be downloaded from our website under "Building Permit." If you have a project in mind, please call or come by City Hall for more information on obtaining a permit.
- · Yard sale, parades, use of public parks, and other general permits can be applied for online at the

- "Permit Form" section of our website. Final permits are issued through City Hall. Please call or come by City Hall for more information on obtaining a permit.
- There is a link at our website under "Links" where you can report any streetlights that are out of order directly to LG&E for repairs under "Streetlight Outage Online Form."
- Permits are required for any work on city street easement trees including pruning or removal. Permits allow for the city to confirm tree companies are insured and to ensure the work being done will contribute to the overall health of our urban tree canopy. If you are unsure if your tree is in the easement, contact our Code Enforcement Officer Otto Mock at <a href="mailto:Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com">Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com</a> or 502-554-6105.
- Going on vacation? Leaving town business? Whatever the reason may be, being away from your home for any length of time can lead to anxiety if you have security concerns. The Audubon Park Police Department House Watch program is designed to provide you with peace of mind by placing your address on a stepped-up patrol list for those living in the City limits of Audubon Park. Officers in your area will be instructed to keep a close eye on your property and to conduct area checks more regularly while you are away. - There is a link at our website under "Links" where you can "Report A Problem" to MSD regarding stormwater waste issues.
- A resident Code Enforcement Complaint Form is located at the website so concerned residents can electronically report garbage, debris, graffiti, abandoned vehicles and property, parking, and overgrowth violations. Our Part-Time Code Enforcement Officer is Otto Mock and he can be reached at <a href="mailto:Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com">Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com</a> or 502-554-6105.

- Please discourage children and others from climbing trees in the various City parks, out of concern for both safety and potential damage.
- Information regarding ash trees and the emerald ash borer is available at City Hall, and on the Forest Board's archive Web site, TreeCommittee-APKY.org.
- Waste of all types garbage, recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays (with occasional exceptions for holidays which is usually a day or two later). Garbage is picked up from behind your house, while yard waste and recycling items are to be placed at the curb. Do not place garbage at the curb as only yard waste and recycling are to be placed at the curb. Be sure to report any missed collection to City Hall.
- Please wear reflective clothing or other reflective gear or, better still, carry powered lights if you are out running, biking or walking in reduced light. It can be very difficult to see you if you are wearing dark clothing! Please take personal responsibility for your safety so accidents don't occur you may be harder to see than you think!
- MSD offers rate assistance for senior citizens that are age 65 or older, have a gross annual income of \$35,000 or less and are both Louisville Water and MSD customers. An application can be made for a 30% discount on wastewater charges and the EPA surcharge by calling 502-540-6000.
- Audubon Park has a Little Free Library located at the intersection of Wren and Audubon Parkway. The Little Free Library is a book/magazine/DVD/CD exchange for adults and children where you are free to drop off or take materials located in the outdoor book holder. - Two Social media pages on Facebook are in use to make announcements, schedule activities and events, exchange ideas, and promote dialogue: Audubon Park City Hall, the main civic page and Audubon Park Police Department, focusing on law enforcement and public safety. Be sure to like

both pages in order to receive communication from them. Audubon Park Residents, Friends of Audubon Park, and Friends & Residents of Audubon Park are not official Audubon Park Facebook pages.

- **Nextdoor** is social networking site that brings back good old-fashioned neighborhood chatter between your neighbors across the street and you. It puts you in touch with folks down the block and even people a few miles down the road. Nextdoor is also like Facebook, where you can scan through your contacts' posts and photos, and you can post your own messages and photos. You might alert those neighbors to prowlers you spotted in the neighborhood. Your neighbors might recommend a good plumber or mechanic. They could also tell you about yard sales or appliances they're giving away. Or you can alert them to a stray dog you found.
- An **email subscriber list** distributing the newsletter and notices of City activities and events. Please sign up on the Web site, under the Resident Information tab, at "Audubon Park News."
- **ReachAlert** is an urgent notification system, with email, text or voicemail options, for emergency and other alert messages. Please subscribe to this system, on the same page, at "ReachAlert."
- The variety of regular public Council and board meetings are listed on the **Web calendar**.
- · Or, just dropping by **City Hall**, for information or an informal chat.

Please take advantage of all these resources for civic awareness and engagement.

State law also requires ordinances and some other official notices to be published, either by newspaper, or first-class direct mail. With current newspaper circulation, and rates, mailings are a much better choice – so you may see things like this delivered from time to time. Always be sure to let the mayor or your favorite council member know your thoughts and ideas!
