FOREST BOARD NEWS

While the kids are back in school and summer is winding down, your Forest Board has been busy planning for next year's tree planting! We've ordered sixty-five trees to be planted in Audubon Park including twenty new dogwoods, hornbeams, Kentucky yellowwoods, and tulip poplars! Now we need your help to find them good homes!

Remember, if you've taken down a tree in the right of way easement (typically but not always 15 feet from the street,) we need you to replace that tree within a year. We've arranged a partnership with the wonderful non-profit Trees Louisville that lets us get high quality trees for a very low price, and we're willing to help you replant.

For \$150 we'll provide the tree, and even plant it for you in the proper way, at the correct time of the year in consultation with you. You decide where you want it, and we'll take care of the rest! If you've seen the new trees planted this spring in the parks and along the streets, you know these are six foot plus sized healthy trees that will serve our community for decades. And if you've shopped at local nurseries, I think you'll agree this is a great price.

We've listened to residents' requests and have purposely selected trees that don't drop a mess in your yard, are fast growing and reliable. Look for us at upcoming community events to get more information about the trees we've ordered. We can talk about what kind of tree is right for your space and make a plan to get it in the ground.

Of course, if you already know you want a tree, feel free to drop me an email, call or text and I'll get you added to the 2024 Tree Planting List right away! If you want to talk about what trees might be best, feel free to reach out and we'll be in touch.

If you prefer to select your own tree and plant it on your own, that's perfectly fine too. We're still happy to provide any advice and support we can.



Winter Clean Up Tips

Despite our recent balmy temperatures, fall and winter will be upon us before we realize it. Following are several tips to get your yard and garden ready for winter and to give you a head start for the spring:

Lawns should be raked and mowed ahead of winter. If leaves are left on grass, they can compact and provide a breeding ground for fungus or other leaf diseases (not to mention they look messy!)

Mulch around trees to within 3 -6 inches from the trunk (leaves can be helpful here) so that the mulching materials will help retain moisture and act as a thermal blanket. Likewise, mulching in flower beds helps allow bulbs and perennials to stay dormant if we get warmer temps in January or February.

Don't fertilize perennials and woody plants – that will just force growth and winter kill. If pruning is needed, wait till after the plants have become dormant.

If we lack rain or snow during late fall and early winter, try to keep newly planted trees or shrubs

well mulched and watered. This will help them thrive as they are most vulnerable in the early days following planting and the surrounding ground may wick water away from them.

Bring in houseplants before the average frost date. Detach hoses after late watering to prevent damage from freezing water which can destroy them.

For our bird friends, don't forget to watch out for them during the winter months when natural food sources are less prevalent. Birds need three things to survive: water, food, and shelter. Good sources of food during the winter include suet cakes which provide calories that convert to body heat. They are inexpensive to buy or can be easily made by melting lard in a large container and adding unsalted peanut butter, cornmeal, oatmeal, unsalted raw peanuts, raisins, dried fruit or black oil sunflower seeds. This can be a great kid activity by stuffing the mixture into pinecones and hanging from trees. If you buy pre-mixed seed, look for those high in black oil sunflower seeds and/or white proso millet. Striped sunflower seeds aren't good sources of carbohydrates to help birds make it through the cold winter. If possible, place feeders close (5-10 feet) from shrubs or trees in a southfacing area to provide shelter and protection from cold winds and predators. And don't forget to provide water for your feathered friends - keep ice broken in birdbaths or use a small heater to keep the water from freezing.

And please be considerate of the many plants and




shrubs that decorate our yards and walkways and protect

them from your pets! Pet urine is high in nitrogen which can harm or kill ornamental plants; while one dog may not hurt a plant by urinating one-time, repeated volume by multiple pets or those who "mark" a plant can cumulatively cause a lot of damage and kill shrubs. So please be considerate of your pet's activities as you walk them through the fall and winter months!


News You Can Use!

· Be a good neighbor and pick up after your pets!

- Building permits are issued through City Hall and the form can be downloaded from our website under "Building Permit."
- Permits are required for any work on city street easement trees including pruning or removal. Permits allow the city to confirm tree companies are insured.
- Otto Mock is the Audubon Park Code Enforcement Officer. If you have questions about tree pruning, building plans, or would like to make a complaint regarding a violation, please reach out to Otto. 502-554-6105 or Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com
- If you are going out of town, you can put your house on House Watch free of charge. Officers keep a close eye on your property and conduct area checks while you are away. Fill out the form on our website under "Forms/sign ups."



Kentucky's Constitution allows property owners who are 65 or older to receive the Homestead Exemption on their primary residence. The exemption amount is subtracted from your property's assessed value, reducing your property tax liability.



 Trash can only be set out the day prior to pick up and must be removed from the street on the day of garbage collection. Any mattresses or upholstered items set out for pickup must be wrapped in plastic.
