The first few months as Mayor have been busy! I want to start by thanking all the previous and current civic volunteers, (too numerous to name but sincerely appreciated) along with current part-time and full-time employees. Without the assistance of both civic volunteers and employees, our city would not be the best Audubon Park it can be. Congrats to council member Andrew Klump and Brittney Gorter on winning another term on city council. Also, congratulations to new council members: Jennifer Kleier, Madeline Mittel Bozeman, Austin Schwenker, and Stephanie George. I look forward to continue working with you all and thank you for your service!

Along with the city council by my side, I've hit the ground running. Continued recodification efforts, franchise agreements, budget planning, bond resolutions, and insurance business taxes are just a few issues being addressed. In addition, our website has been updated, eighteen new board members have been appointed, and a part-time code officer has been hired, which is helping us revamp our city. You may begin to notice small physical improvements such as beautification and restoration efforts at our entrances along with several parks that have updated water and electrical capabilities.

I'm honored to work side by side with Police Chief, Mike Minniear and the police department that continues to make our neighborhood safe along with City Clerk, Janette Mercer who keeps this city functioning on a daily basis.

Traditionally, the Festival of the Dogwood has been the third week of April. ### **FOREST BOARD NEWS**

Priorities of the Forest Board include increasing the tree canopy and reducing tree canopy loss. Trees provide many benefits not least of which is reducing the neighborhood temperature. When sunlight warms the ground and pavement, heat is absorbed and released at night. This means our summer nighttime temperatures are higher which means we start the day with increased temperatures. This is known as the urban heat island effect. Temperatures in Louisville are always higher than the surrounding rural area. This can impact air quality and increase the impact of droughts.

In order to decrease the urban heat island impact right here in Audubon Park we need to strive to provide shade on all of our streets. Every paved area of any size that receives sun will increase the urban heat cycle.

The Audubon Park Forest Board has been planting trees in the right of way areas since 2007, both to help ease resident responsibilities, and to promote a healthy and diverse urban forest. Over the years we have offered various programs, providing free or reduced prices, and have successfully planted over 160 trees. If the street in front of your home is not shaded, please contact Leah Netherland @ 638-8919 to see if a canopy tree is appropriate for your site or to get involved in volunteering with our tree care programs.

## **AUDUBON PARK POLICE**

Greetings to everyone from the Audubon Park Police



Department! I have had the pleasure of serving the Audubon Park residents as a Major and Chief of Police since August 2013. I'm a proud veteran of the United States Navy and have also retired from the Louisville Metro Police. This has been my favorite job in Law Enforcement in many ways, and also my toughest. The challenge of

keeping a community safe in an urban environment with the surroundings of Audubon Park is not easy. I'm constantly analyzing the crime data around us and adjusting the operations of the police force to keep you safe. My hope is residents realize the benefit of having a police force is worth the expense. Crime rates in Audubon Park remain extremely low. Here's a comparison of reported crimes so far this year in Audubon Park within 1 ½ mile radius of our city hall:

Assaults	64	0
Thefts	202	2
Burglaries	34	0
Fraud	106	2
Robberies	10	0

We are one of the safest cities in Kentucky! Your Audubon Park police officers strive to provide excellence in law enforcement services to you while working within strict budget parameters to keep the taxpayer cost at a minimum. Our greatest deterrence of crime are the residents calling the police anytime you see anything suspicious. Please send any pictures or video of suspicious activity to the police force. We have identified many suspects with the "Ring Doorbell" cameras.

Please follow these tips to help prevent crime:

- Lock all doors to your house, garage, and vehicles
- Keep fence gates on your property closed
- Soliciting is not allowed, do not give money to door knockers (Keep in mind religious groups and politicians can go door to door)
- Use lighting at night around your house
- Do not leave anything of value in plain view in vour vehicle
- Close and lock garage doors
- Register for house watch when travelling (via audubonparkky.org, or just visit the station).
  Another reason for our low crime rate: 2,641 house watches last year
- Keep your yard viewable and uncluttered
- Bring mail and other deliveries inside promptly

Have you heard about a new *free* device that will prevent **90** % of thefts from vehicles??? Use the lock button on your car every time you exit your vehicle!

### **FRIENDLY REMINDERS**

In addition to community calendars, event notices, meeting schedules, and official information, the entire City Code of Ordinances is available on the Web site, *AudubonParkKY.org*, with provisions on parking, permit requirements, nuisance abatement, and all the rest. Please visit often!

- Speed limits and other traffic control measures are strictly enforced, for your safety and security. The City speed limit is 25 mph.
- There is no parking permitted on the street between 2 AM and 6 AM. There is also no parking permitted on the grass. Please inform visitors of this important information.
- Pets must be leashed or otherwise under their owner's absolute physical control when outside. The return of spring birds is a special reminder to keep cats and others from straying. We have just installed Dog Waste Stations at each of our parks so please use them when dog walking, and picking up after your pets.
- Building permits are issued through City Hall and the form can be downloaded from our website under "Building Permit." If you have a project in mind, please call or come by City Hall for more information on obtaining a permit.
- Easement tree pruning or removal, yard sale, parades, use of public parks, and other general permits can be applied for online at the "Permit Form" section of our website. Final permits are issued through City Hall. Please call or come by City Hall for more information on obtaining a permit.
- There is a link at our website under "Links" where you can report any streetlights that are out of order directly to LG&E for repairs under "Streetlight Outage Online Form."
- There is also a link at our website under "Links" where you can "Report A Problem" to MSD regarding stormwater waste issues.
- A resident Code Enforcement Complaint Form has been added to the website so concerned residents can electronically report garbage, debris, graffiti, abandoned vehicles and property, parking, and overgrowth violations. Our Part-Time Code Enforcement Officer is Otto Mock and he can be reached at Audubonparkcodeofficer@gmail.com.

- Please discourage children and others from climbing trees in the various City parks, out of concern for both safety and potential damage.
- Information regarding ash trees and the emerald ash borer is available at City Hall, and on the Forest Board's archive Web site, TreeCommittee-APKY.org.
- · Waste of all types garbage, recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays (with occasional exceptions for holidays). Garbage is picked up from behind your house, while yard waste and recycling items are to be placed at the curb. Do not place garbage at the curb as only yard waste and recycling are to be placed at the curb. Be sure to report any missed collection to City Hall.
- Please wear reflective clothing or other reflective gear – or, better still, carry powered lights – if you are out running, biking or walking in reduced light. It can be very difficult to see you if you are wearing dark clothing! Please take personal responsibility for this so accidents don't occur – you may be harder to see than you think!

## **BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT**

During the most recent election cycle, it became



apparent that the residents of Audubon Park are concerned with the success and development of businesses along our western border of Preston Highway. Fortunately, businesses have

recently opened, increasing the attractiveness and walkability of our lone commercial district. To spur connection between our community and our businesses, this spotlight article will showcase one of our Audubon Park businesses each quarter. Hopefully upon reviewing their stories, products, and services, you will consider supporting our local Audubon Park businesses, fostering the creation of an encouraging economic environment, heightening our standard of living.

### Vic's Classic Bikes

Vic's Classic Bikes (VCB) has been restoring and selling Classic road Bikes from the 70's and 80's in Louisville, Kentucky for 10 years. The first 2 years sales were from a garage in Fern Creek. The first retail store front was opened on Preston Street near UofL. Within a



year, the move was made to Baxter Avenue in the Highlands which would be home for the next 6 years. The real estate values and corresponding rents in the Highlands became unsustainable when the building on Baxter sold and the new

owners delivered the news that rents were to double. Within 2 months the business was relocated to 3139 Preston Highway and soon after the building at was 3141 Preston Highway was purchased as the new home of Vic's Classic Bikes.

VCB specialty has always been the restoration of classic road bikes, but we also carry an entry level line of new bicycles called Pure Cycles. A complete line of bicycles under Pure Cycles include road, commuter, and single speed/fixed gear, cruiser and city bike models all in the \$300.00 to \$600.00 range. We are a full-service repair and service shop and carry a full-line of parts and accessories.

Vic's Classic Bikes is excited about being part of the Audubon Park Community and look forward to working with and bringing rides and special events to the neighborhood.

Please take advantage of all these resources for civic awareness and engagement.
