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MAYOR'S MUSINGS

A busy and eventful term of office is about to conclude, and while regretting the personal circumstances that compel me, I look forward to a smooth and amiable transition to new leadership. As a capstone, this report has a lot more ground to cover than usual; but that would make the usual narrative form a real reader's chore. Instead, here's a more concise simple list of the main efforts I've undertaken the last five years to bring the City to its current condition, which I'm proud and happy to pass along to the next administration:

- Reformed our tax and fee structure to reduce and spread its impact over the year
- Worked with PVA to redesign annual tax bills for clarity and readability
- Integrated auditing in the management and analysis process
- Developed an evolving set of fiscal tools to insure optimum transparency, accountability and spending discipline
- Overcame a \$300K deficit to regain City solvency, then began directing available resources to neglected facilities and programs
- Overhauled our sanitation program to reduce fees and restrict funds, maintain essential services at lower cost, and monitor operations to address problems
- Defended the City's character and integrity from administrative and legal challenges

- Made close relationships with state legislators and advocacy groups to follow General Assembly developments, and protect and promote City interests
- Conducted a complete overhaul and update of our City Code of Ordinances, last compiled in 1996
- Established a state-sanctioned overlay district to preserve City ordinances on responsible land use
- Streamlined city staffing and procedures to increase responsiveness and minimize costs
- Recruited new police leadership, and fostered a community policing model
 - o Professional, second-career, part-time force
 - o Networked for recruiting replacements as needed
 - Close-knit community outreach bike patrols, house watch, Halloween gigs, media
 - Proactive crime prevention and devotion to civic order
- Established or restored key City offices, including Engineer, Archivist, Bookkeeper, and Attorney
- Established or refilled City boards to oversee key functional areas: ethics, code enforcement, forest management, and parks and recreation programs
- Set up points of contact with utilities and service providers to promote good relations and responsive support
- Pursued long-deferred capital improvements, including

- o City Hall repairs and maintenance
- o Restoration of entrance columns
- o Playscape park facilities
- o Forest management and renewal
- o Road repair, repaving and sustainment planning
- Sidewalk assessment
- Launched an extensive program of activities and events to promote community spirit and interaction
 - Dogwood Festival opening ceremony
 - o Arbor Day commemoration
 - o Easter egg hunt
 - o Independence Day parade
 - o Block party
 - o Fall festival/Auktoberfest
 - Outdoor movies
 - o Flag ceremonies on patriotic occasions
- Developed a broad range of media channels to boost information flow and feedback
 - Meetings/Town Halls
 - o City Hall open door
 - o Telephone/email networks
 - o Emergency notification systems
 - o Retooled Web site
 - o Facebook and Nextdoor streams
 - Newsletters
 - o Direct mail
- Emphasized innovation and willingness to experiment in seeking new solutions to City problems and goals – from fiscal practices, to traffic management, tax policy, legislation, community programs, communications, and more.

While there's still plenty left to do, as always, it's my best hope that these efforts have left the City in solid shape to continue moving forward – and still have some fun on the side. I've pledged my dedicated successor, Tony Williams, any ongoing advice and assistance I can offer from the sidelines, and wish him and the new Council every success.

- 3) Use a cab, a ride-sharing service or a designated driver. We want everyone to make it home safely after holiday parties and outings.

FOREST BOARD NEWS

The Forest Board would like to take this opportunity to thank Dorn for his service and to reflect on our accomplishments while he has been Mayor.

We have been able to expand our tree planting efforts and to initiate new tree maintenance programs because of the budget that has been approved each year by this Mayor and the City Councils. During previous administrations our budget was generally limited to grants and generous donations by residents. For the past several years we have requested and been granted a generous yearly budget designated specifically for responsible forest management. This has allowed us to plan ahead and to develop relationships with nurseries and tree professionals.

- We now designate part of our budget each year to have arborists prune in the parks to improve tree health and avoid more catastrophic damage during storms.
- The treatment of some of our Ash trees was already underway when Mayor Crawford took office, but since then funding has been secured for ongoing treatment.
- We have been able to begin the long-anticipated project of providing a water supply for trees in each park.
- We have been able to initiate and expand many cooperative projects between homeowners and the City.
- We have been able to offset homeowner cost for various planting and pruning activities. Many more homeowners have been able to participate in Forest Board projects.

With Dorn as Mayor the Forest Board has become an integral part of the City of Audubon Park. We have truly appreciated your passionate support and encouragement. Thanks, Dorn!

FRIENDLY REMINDERS

In addition to community calendars, event notices, meeting schedules, and official information, the entire City Code of Ordinances is available on the Web site, *AudubonParkKY.org*, with provisions on parking, permit requirements, nuisance abatement, and all the rest. Please visit often!

- Speed limits and other traffic control measures are strictly enforced, for your safety and security. The City speed limit is 25 mph.
- There is no parking permitted on the street between 2 AM and 6 AM. There is also no parking permitted on the grass. Please inform visitors of this important information.
- · Pets must be leashed or otherwise under their owner's physical control when outside. When dog walking, please pick up after them.
- Building, tree, and property sale permits are issued through City Hall. If you have a project in mind, a tree you would like to trim or remove on the easement, or if you would like to have a yard sale, please call or come by City Hall for more information on obtaining a permit.
- Report any streetlights that are out of order or malfunctioning to City Hall, at 637-5066. This input will be relayed to LG&E for repairs.
- Please discourage children and others from climbing trees in the various City parks, out of concern for both safety and potential damage.
- Information regarding ash trees and the emerald ash borer is available at City Hall, and on the Forest Board's archive Web site, TreeCommittee-APKY.org.
- · Waste of all types garbage, recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays (with occasional exceptions for holidays). Garbage is picked up from behind your house, while yard waste and recycling items are to be placed at the curb. Be sure to report any missed collection to City Hall.

Be Safe While Walking, Biking or Running

Please wear reflective clothing or other reflective gear – or, better still, carry powered lights – if you are out running, biking or walking in reduced light. It can be very difficult to see you if you are wearing dark clothing! Please take personal responsibility for this so accidents don't occur – you may be harder to see than you think!

COMMUNICATIONS

The City is committed to a maximum flow of information and civic dialogue, and has a variety of platforms for these purposes:

- This quarterly newsletter with updates, reports and discussions of City programs, events, services and facilities. The newsletter is published on the Web site, social media, and email subscriber list, and every other issue is delivered on paper to all residences.
- The Web site, AudubonParkKY.org, which is the City's open archive of municipal reference data – organizational, historical, fiscal, legal, and social. Links are also provided to the other media listed.
- Social media pages, used to make announcements, schedule activities and events, exchange ideas, and promote dialogue. Three Facebook pages are in use:
 Audubon Park Residents, the main civic page; *Friends of Audubon Park*, with smaller subscription but generally the same content; and *City of Audubon Park Police*, focusing on law enforcement and public safety.
- An email subscriber list distributing the newsletter and notices of City activities and events. Please sign

- up on the Web site, under the Resident Information tab, at "Audubon Park News."
- An urgent notification system, with email, text or voicemail options, for emergency and other alert messages. Please subscribe to this system, on the same page, at "ReachAlert."
- The variety of regular public Council and board meetings, listed on the Web calendar.
- · Or, just dropping by **City Hall**, for information or an informal chat.

Please take advantage of all these resources for civic awareness and engagement.

State law also requires ordinances and some other official notices to be published, either by newspaper, or first-class direct mail. With current newspaper circulation, and rates, mailings are a much better choice – so you may see things like this in your mailbox from time to time.

Beyond those mandates, we're on our own, and just want to find the channels that do the best (and cheapest!) job of getting the word out. What are your thoughts and ideas?
